

OUR CHANCELLOR, VICE-CHANCELLOR AND CHAIR OF COUNCIL



Meet **Dr Geraldine Fraser-Moleketi**, whose experience, commitment and heart for the continent's social and economic transformation are aligned with the goals of Nelson Mandela University.

Throughout her exemplary career, our Chancellor has worked for economic growth that is more sustainable. She has worked in inter-governmental structures, interacted with political leaders, business leaders and civil society, and has been involved in complex negotiations across different issues and sectors.

The titular head of our institution was previously Director of the United Nations Development Programme's (UNDP) Democratic Governance Group (DGP), based in New York, working across six regional centres in more than 100 countries.

Dr Fraser-Moleketi was Minister for Welfare and Population Development in South Africa's first democratic government and went on to serve as a member of the South African Parliament for three consecutive parliaments (1994 through September 2008).

Some of Chancellor's early achievements include participation in the multi-party negotiation process and as Deputy National Coordinator of the ANC's National Elections Commission ahead of the country's first democratic elections.

Our Chancellor serves on various boards, is a fellow of the Institute of Politics, Kennedy School of Government, at Harvard University, holds a master's degree in administration, and has received several awards, including the OP Dwivedi Public Service Award from the International Association of Schools and Institutes of Public Administration



Professor Sibongile Muthwa is the Vice-Chancellor of Nelson Mandela University. Her second five-year term of office began in April this year.

Professor Muthwa holds a PhD from the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, and an MSc in Development Policy and Planning from London School

of Economics and Political Science. The Vice-Chancellor has enjoyed a distinguished career both in South Africa, and internationally, working in both development and public sector institutions, as well as in academia. Between 2010 and 2017 she was the Deputy Vice-Chancellor for Institutional Support, now known as People and Operations, at Nelson Mandela University.

Professor Muthwa served as the Chairperson of Universities South Africa [USAf] a membership organisation representing all South Africa's universities, that promotes and facilitates optimum conditions for universities to operate effectively and contribute to social, cultural and economic development.

She further serves on the Presidential Human Resource Development Council. Prior to joining the University, she served as Director General of the Eastern Cape Provincial Government [2004 and 2010]. Upon her return to South Africa, before joining government, she was Director of the Fort Hare Institute of Government.

She is deeply committed to gender justice, social inclusion and active democratic participation, and accordingly serves on a number of Boards and advisory structures, including from 2014 as a Commissioner of the Financial and Fiscal Commission, and served as its Deputy Chairperson from 2017-2019.

On September 1, 2024, Nelson Mandela University welcomed **Judge Nambitha Dambuza** as its new Chair of Council. Judge Dambuza, a seasoned South African jurist with over 20 years of experience, currently serves as a judge in the Supreme Court of Appeal. She succeeds Ambassador Nozipho January-Bardill, who has served two terms in the role, and steps into this pivotal governance position with a commitment to infuse the principles of justice into her leadership.

Judge Dambuza holds a BProc and LLB from the University of Natal, and an LLM from Tulane University in the United States. Appointed as a judge in the Eastern Cape Division of the High Court in 2005. In 2015 she secured a permanent position in the Supreme Court of Appeal, where she has also served as Deputy President and Acting President. Judge Dambuza's judicial influence includes her role as a convenor of the newly appointed judges' induction

programme under the South African Judicial Education Institute (SAJEI), and she chairs the Rules Board for South African courts.

Judge Dambuza's involvement in education is noteworthy. She is a visiting professor at Rhodes University's Faculty of Law and has a history of leadership in higher education governance. She previously chaired the Council of Walter Sisulu University, playing a critical role in its turnaround strategy following a period of financial instability.

Judge Nambitha Dambuza brings a deep commitment to environmental stewardship and a strong connection to her Eastern Cape roots to her new role at Nelson Mandela University. She has actively engaged in environmental law initiatives, chairing the African Judicial Network on Environmental Law and serving on the Global Judicial Institute on Environmental Law's board. Her passion for the environment aligns with the university's values, particularly in its Ocean Sciences programme, which she views as a unique and valuable asset.

Judge Dambuza is focused on upholding the values of Nelson Mandela—integrity, Ubuntu, and social justice—while ensuring the university continues to produce graduates who can positively impact society. She emphasises the importance of following one's passion in choosing a career, believing that success comes from doing what one loves and excelling at it.

REASONS TO BE PROUD

Various ground-breaking projects, awards and achievements have given Nelson Mandela University and its staff and students reason to be proud, some of which are included below:

FameLab South Africa 2024 winner

Moved by her grandmother's suffering from a hospital-acquired infection, master's in environmental health student **Yolanda Mbalentle Mngcongo** explored how indigenous knowledge of medicinal plants can be combined with nanoscience to combat modern healthcare challenges.

Through her research she is developing eco-friendly silver nanoparticle filters to enhance hospital air purification systems with the goal of reducing infections and improving patient care for the most vulnerable.

The nanoparticles are environmentally safe, through a special process combining silver and medicinal plants. Her dedication and innovation earned her the title of FameLab South Africa 2024 winner and the opportunity to represent the country on the international stage.





Prof Zingela wins national Women in STEM award

The South African Women in Science Awards announced Nelson Mandela University's Executive Dean of Health Sciences **Prof Zukiswa Zingela**, as its 2024 Distinguished Woman Researcher in August this year.

Prof Zingela was one of 14 national finalists in the SAW-ISA awards ceremony The SAWISA theme this year was "transitioning towards an innovation economy: the role of women leaders in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM)".

Professor Zingela, has been recognised for her work across a range of projects, reflecting her innovations in science and achievements in psychiatry.

Earlier this year, Prof Zingela released her book, EPT to Bloom, stemming from the EPT programme she developed over the COVID-19 pandemic.

Forestry student awarded Abe Bailey bursary

Master's student in Forestry on George Campus, **Avelile Cishe** is Nelson Mandela University's Abe Bailey travel bursary winner and representative for 2024.

The annual Abe Bailey Travel Bursary runs for three weeks, starting in England and ending in Scotland.

The bursary is awarded to selected South African university students to enhance understanding of different viewpoints, languages and cultures - to encourage leadership and open debate, to experience British Culture and promote South African unity.

Avelile graduated cum laude for both his Diploma in Forestry and his BSc Honours in Natural Resource Management and achieved an average of 81.5% for his Advanced Diploma in Forestry.





PhD student wins category in Forty under 40 SA awards

Reino Erasmus, co-founder of Ampersand and PhD student in Mandela University's Centre for Community Technologies, is the winner of the Science, Technology and Innovation category in the Forty under 40 South Africa Awards.

The awards are aimed at recognising and awarding 40 young leaders under the age of 40 for their outstanding impact across industries, such as technology, finance, agriculture, green energy, and creative sectors, driving growth in South Africa's economy. One of Reino's notable contributions is the eReady ICT Readiness Assessment Tool, developed as part of his research at Mandela University.

This tool assesses a school's readiness for ICT integration, aiming to bridge the digital divide and foster equitable educational opportunities across South Africa.

The former institution was formed in 2005 as a the result of the merging of the PE Technikon, the University of Port Elizabeth and the Port Elizabeth campus of Vista University (Vista PE).

The PE Technikon has its roots in the country's oldest art school, the PE Art School founded in 1882; the University of Port Elizabeth (UPE), the country's first dual-medium residential university, came into being on 31 January 1964; and the Port Elizabeth campus of Vista university, which opened up access to higher education for disadvantaged students.

The union of these institutions was part of countrywide restructuring of higher education, intended to deliver a

more equitable and efficient system to meet the needs of South Africa, the continent and the world in the 21st century. Founded on more than a century of quality higher education, Nelson Mandela University nurtures innovation, fosters creativity, embraces technology and develops people to meet the challenges of tomorrow.

Today, Nelson Mandela University is the only university in the world to carry the name of Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela, is a sought-after educational destination and the most diverse university in South Africa.

Results from this study showed that the Chinese learners had flexible ideas around ways of being and doing in relation to 'boyish' and 'girlish' behaviour, as long as' these did not conflict with their perception of 'the law'. This study also highlighted the importance of engaging young children with varied literary inputs and hearing their voices as they expressed moral and critical stances.

By utilising a Freirean framework, the research offers valuable insights towards the development of more equitable and transformative practices in TVET. It emphasises the importance of power, privilege, and social inequality, promoting critical consciousness among students, and fostering

the skills and knowledges relevant to their lives and to the development needs of their communities. The study underscores the importance of the social and cultural contexts in which TVET is located by advocating for a holistic approach that integrates these elements to better serve the human flourishing of students and their communities.

PREVALENCE AND CORRELATES OF SICKNESS PRESENTEEISM AMONG SECONDARY SCHOOL TEACHERS IN THE BUKEDI REGION OF EASTERN UGANDA

The aim of the study was to establish the prevalence and correlates of sickness presenteeism among secondary school teachers in the Bukedi region in Eastern Uganda. The study adopted a pragmatic philosophy and a sequential explanatory mixed method design, which involved a sample of teachers, principals, heads of department and administrators from the Department of Education in the region. The findings indicate that staff working in people-based service sectors are most likely to

engage in sickness presenteeism. The correlation of interpersonal and institutional characteristics of the sampled teachers with their engagement in sickness presenteeism were found to have equivalent influence on the human resource challenge. Based on the findings it is strongly suggested that school management teams and the Department of Education are sensitised to sickness presenteeism.

ACHIEVEMENT IN MATHEMATICS THROUGH SELF-DIRECTED LEARNING FACILITATION: AN IMPACT EVALUATION OF AN OFFLINE TECHNOLOGICAL APPROACH

An ex-post impact evaluation of an off-line technology-enhanced intervention strategy for mathematics teaching and learning was undertaken. The strategy was developed by the Govan Mbeki Mathematics Development Centre at Nelson Mandela University in the Eastern Cape Province of South Africa. The study evaluated self-directed learning (SDL) skills facilitation and thus acquisition, by employing statistical analysis of secondary qualitative and quantitative data, in a mixed methods approach, with primary qualitative data integrated

into the secondary qualitative data. The methodology included Contribution Analysis. The results showed that providing educational technology, used offline, combined with blended learning, significantly improved learner mathematics knowledge; conceptual understanding; positive self-perceptions; and intrinsic motivation to learn and that, self-regulated learning plays an integral role in SDL skills facilitation.

ECONOMIC DIVERSIFICATION AND SOCIO-ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: A CASE OF NAMIBIA

The study examined economic diversification and socio economic development (1990 2021). Employing mixedmethods approach the study reveals fluctuating diversification levels, with greatest diversification experienced in year 2005, which coincides with the National Development Plan (NDP) 2. Empirical estimation showed that positive determinants of diversification include education, institutional quality and Foreign Direct Investment (FDI), while financial sector development and natural resources rent are negative determinants. On the other hand, economic diversification positively influences economic development through employment creation,

poverty reduction and economic growth. The study recommends investing in human capital, improving competitiveness, and enhancing institutional quality by improving immigration, trade and investment regulations and good governance for effective economic diversification.

TRADE LIBERALISATION IN BRICS COUNTRIES AND ITS IMPLICATIONS ON THE SOUTH AFRICAN ECONOMY

This study examines the impact of trade liberalisation in BRICS countries on South Africa's economic growth from 1995 to 2018, using the pooled mean group (PMG) estimator and autoregressive distributive lags model on a country-by-country basis. Based on the PMG simulation, the results show that trade liberalisation in BRICS countries positively impacts South Africa's economic growth both in the long and short run during the period under review. Notwithstanding, import tariffs in BRICS countries hinder economic growth in South Africa. The PMG results are also confirmed country-by-country. Autoregressive Distributive Lags (ARDL) models used in the study proved that trade liberalization in BRICS positively

impact South African economic growth. The study recommends that enhancing trade liberalisation in BRICS economies can bring significant economic advantages to all BRICS countries. This can be accomplished through negotiations and establishing a free trade area among member nations.

FACTORS AFFECTING CONSUMER PURCHASE INTENTIONS TOWARDS TRADITIONAL SMALL GRAIN FOODS IN ZIMBABWE

Traditional small grain foods like sorghum, millet and rapoko can bolster food security and safeguard agricultural livelihoods in drought-prone Zimbabwe, given their nutritious and drought-resilient qualities. However, their consumption is declining. To address this challenge, this doctoral research empirically developed and validated the Traditional Small Grain Foods Preference Model, which explains and predicts consumer intentions to purchase these foods, thereby advancing the frontiers of African consumer behaviour scholarship. Moreover, this novel model offers insights for formulating marketing

strategies to stimulate consumer demand for these foods, ultimately contributing to the attainment of United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals 1 and 2 (eradicating poverty and hunger) respectively.

SOCIO - ECONOMIC CONSEQUENCES OF PHYSICAL DISPLACEMENT: BEHAVIOURAL ANALYSIS IN THE EASTERN CAPE, SOUTH AFRICA

This study examines the socio-economic consequences of physical displacements, focusing on two prominent displacements: primary displacement, which affects individuals who are physically relocated, and secondary displacement, which pertains to those who become excluded from access to essential amenities. The study compared the risk attitudes, livelihood strategies, and social capital of movers, non-movers and receivers populations through surveys and experimental games. Key findings indicate that displaced individuals (movers) exhibit a consistent aversion to risk in both survey and experimental contexts. The analysis also revealed a lack of strong social bonds and connections among

households within these groups. However, a significant link between social capital and livelihood outcomes was identified. Overall, the study concludes that physical displacements have detrimental effects on rural communities beyond what is catered for in compensations provided.

THE INFLUENCE OF LEADER INTELLECTUAL HUMILITY ON EMPLOYEE ENGAGEMENT AND RETENTION IN AN ACADEMIC ENVIRONMENT

Higher education institutions play a critical role in the development and dissemination of knowledge and skills for a knowledge economy. In South Africa specifically, higher education institutions are challenged to transform, democratise and decolonise, as well as to elevate the voices of historically marginalised and diverse groups. This study explored intellectual within an academic environment, specifically the influence of leader intellectual humility on the engagement and retention of academics. qualitative analysis revealed that intellectual humility was perceived a desired competency for all academics

in higher education as it cultivated a culture of respect, diverse perspectives, and inclusion. A high level of intellectual humility was found among the academics surveyed, irrespective of being in a leadership or non leadership position. A significant positive link with employee engagement and retention could not be established.
